Review: *Blackbird Pie*

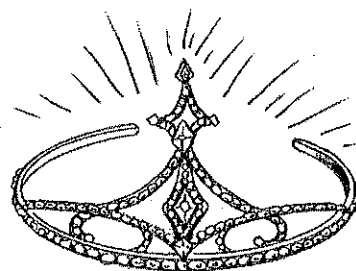
If fairy tales annoy you, avoid the new play at the regent theater. However, if you devour fantasy tales, don't miss *Blackbird Pie*. It involves a haughty queen, a kind princess, a naughty court jester, and two young men. One man lives in a royal palace but is a scoundrel. The other is poor but a Prince at heart. In act I, two heralds announce that the princess is to be wed. Then twist follows turn until viewers rejoice at the outcome. Though sweet, the play does not cross the boundary into corniness. The Town Players are flawless actors, and Tia Stone gives a thoughtful portrayal of princess Eva.
